BAPTISM / CHRISTENING (MEANS THE SAME THING)

There's lots of survival guides out there, I often see people reading them on the tube: "The game of life and how to succeed," and other such naff titles. They all omit the obvious problem with people's lives: the need for God. Blessed are those who know they need God.

Baptism makes us members of the Body of Christ, ensuring our lives are united with the life of Jesus Christ. We are buried in to His death and raised with Him to eternal life (Romans 6:4). We are therefore given everything we need in Baptism to get to Heaven, which is a wonderful demonstration of God's love and kindness.

Sadly a minority of Christians think that baptising babies doesn't work, that it needs topping up when they are adults, when they "understand the faith," when they can make the profession themselves, they need "believers' baptism" (not a term in the Bible). In the Bible we hear of "households" being baptised (Acts 10:48, 16:15 and 33, I Corinthians 7:14). This term specifically would have meant slaves and children were being baptised. This was shockingly radical! It meant the Christian community realised Baptism to be about God's grace and not a test of individuals based on the world's view.

Baptism also cleanses us of our sin. We're all born with some inherited guilt, which the Church calls "Original Sin." We see this concept in the Psalms, for example: "Indeed, I was born guilty, a sinner when my mother conceived me." Baptism is a fresh start. Sadly we will sin again and we are given ways of dealing with that, apologising through confession and being rehabilitated through the Mass and through acts of charity and devotion.

As we get older people will start asking us to be godparents and it's a chance for us to reflect on how we live out our discipleship of Jesus Christ. Being a godparent is being a role model. Sadly too many of us have just accepted that the next generation is going to be less Christian than we are. Our prayer should be that our godchildren will be more devout and more faithful to Christ than we are. They'll learn our good habits but sadly also our bad habits and so it is with extra resolve that we seek to ditch that which we don't want to pass on to others.

God looks on us all with immense love, seeing us reborn in the waters of baptism.
