

First and foremost ... Duty

When Queen Elizabeth II died many observed how strong was her sense of duty. Even leaders of countries strongly opposed to the concept of monarchy, such as the United States of America, the Republic of Ireland and France, spoke in admiration of her spirit of service.

Some observers worry that duty is not fashionable these days. I can see where these worries come from but I don't like simply labelling generations as being this or that. One online article headline I saw said that the current generation values feelings more than duty. I'd be interested to know if you agree or think that is a problem.

Duty is something we are obliged to do. We have duties to God, to ourselves and to others. If feelings are the polar opposite of duties, it is because feelings are internal emotions and need not lead us to alter our behaviour at all.



But who defines what our duties are and how do we know them? The summary of the Law given by Jesus must be the foundation: Love God and your neighbour as yourself (St Matthew 22:37-39). Love is patient and kind, it keeps no record of wrong but rejoices in the truth, love never ends, love leads Jesus to die on the Cross for us. We thank you, Most Merciful Saviour.

Exploring the Scripture

Genesis 11 - The Tower of Babel


Now the whole earth had one language and the same words. 2 And as they migrated from the east, they came upon a plain in the land of Shinar and settled there. 3 And they said to one another, 'Come, let us make bricks, and burn them thoroughly.' And they had brick for stone, and bitumen for mortar. 4 Then they said, 'Come, let us build ourselves a city, and a tower with its top in the heavens, and let us make a name for ourselves; otherwise we shall be scattered abroad upon the face of the whole earth.' 5 The Lord came down to see the city and the tower, which mortals had built. 6 And the Lord said, 'Look, they are one people, and they have all one language; and this is only the beginning of what they will do; nothing that they propose to do will now be impossible for them. 7 Come, let us go down, and confuse their language there, so that they will not understand one another's speech.' 8 So the Lord scattered them abroad from there over the face of all the earth, and they left off building the city. 9 Therefore it was called Babel, because there the Lord confused the language of all the earth; and from there the Lord scattered them abroad over the face of all the earth.

Explanation. The first book of the Bible, Genesis is trying to explain why life is as it is. In Genesis 11 it's trying to explain why everyone speaks different languages. Whenever we read the Old Testament we should try to see how Jesus fulfils all that is said there (see St Matthew 5:17 to explain why). In the case of the the Tower of Babel we should look to Acts 2:1-13, the Day of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit descended on Mary and the Apostles, sent by the Risen Jesus. The Spirit comes and the Apostles speak normally but they can be understood by people who speak different languages. It's amazing! The Church, the Body of Christ, therefore brings people together from different races and language.

In contrast, as people try to build this huge tower, we see that pride divides humanity. The sin of pride is revealed in verse 4 "Let us make a name for ourselves." The people want celebrity, fame, popularity and to be thought well of others.

God isn't having it. As is often the case in the Old Testament, God is spoken of in very human terms (anthropomorphic), for example He has to go down to see what is happening in verse 5. It's the same God in the Old Testament as the one we worship today but they spoke about Him in different ways sometimes.

Babel is in what is known today as Iraq and stood in the biblical city of Babylon, always a dangerous place for God's people, far away from where they called home (see Psalm 137).

- Pray about it! God hears our requests "Ask, and it shall be given you" he tells us. Be specific, be persistent and have faith.
